# **PUEBLITO CANADA PROJECTS**

#### **VOICES FOR CHANGE (V4C): LEADERSHIP IN INCLUSIVE EDUCATION**

In 2014, Pueblito launched *Voices for Change* (V4C): *Developing Leadership in Inclusive Education* – a follow up to our successful 2012 *Our Voices in Schools* project. V4C addresses the alarming dropout rate of 40% among Latino-Hispanic youth in Toronto – a rate that far surpasses the national average and one that appears to be growing. Generously funded by the Ontario Trillium Foundation, V4C provides professional

development opportunities to teachers in order to help them improve student retention and success rates. V4C also builds leadership among Latino-Hispanic youth so that they are prepared to advocate for teaching that addresses their needs.

#### MY BEST: MODEL FOR BILINGUAL EDUCATION AND SUCCESSFUL TEACHING



In 2014 Pueblito and the Foundation for the Autonomy and Development of the Atlantic Coast of Nicaragua (FADCANIC) completed our three-year MyBEST project. The project improved the quality of pre-primary and primary bilingual and intercultural education for youth in the indigenous communities on the Atlantic Coast of Nicaragua. The bilingual system is essential to the cultural survival of the peoples of the Coast. The higher quality education available helped reduce drop out rates among 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> grade students.

MyBEST directly benefited 2,867 students, 58 teachers, and 14 pre-primary schools representing 12 communities within the municipality of Pearl Lagoon. The project has made a lasting impact on families, students, teachers, and

the surrounding communities that have far exceeded our targets. A very strong relationship was built between the MyBEST staff, the schoolteachers, and the Ministry of Education; this will ensure that the content of the workshops and the textbooks acquired will continue to be used following this project.

Pueblito acknowledges the generous support of the Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development (DFATD).

#### PRIMARY COLOURS II

in public primary school students through art-based education in and around Estelí, Nicaragua. In partnership with FUNARTE, we trained teachers, school counselors, principals and parents in innovative education methodologies. These workshops provided teachers with tools to promote social, psychological, emotional and cognitive development. The project impacted 4,137 first and second graders, 50 teachers and 5 representatives (counselors, Ministry of Education Representatives, and 1 Director of Teacher Training). Our work in 12 of the poorest public schools in Estelí has kept 300 students in school who were at high risk of leaving. In Estelí, most students drop out of school in grades 1 or 2, eliminating their ability to continue their elementary educations.



Pueblito partnered with York University and FADCANIC sent teacher candidates to Pearl Lagoon, Nicaragua to complete their practicum placements. This program benefited teachers in Pearl Lagoon by providing them with new teaching strategies and pedagogical innovations. The Canadian teacher candidates learned about bilingual and multi-cultural education. The reciprocal cultural exchange and professional development facilitated by this project are at the heart of Pueblito's transformative approach to education and child development.

# **HIGHLIGHTS**

## **CASA-CANADIENSE PROJECTS**

**COFFEE WITH THE SCENT OF A WOMAN** Casa supported the third phase of the coffee cultivation project which began in 2012. The goal of the project was to improve the livelihoods of women in the Gloria Quintanilla Cooperative. In 2014, the third phase of the project consisted of the harvesting and processing of the coffee beans. Materials for the processing, packaging, and marketing of 800 pounds of coffee were provided. The women also attended two workshops on basic accounting, labeling and presentation. The project directly benefited 16 women members in the Gloria Quintanilla Cooperative.

INTERCONNECTED LIVES: STRENGTHENING EDUCATION

Partnered with North Batahola Cultural Center (CCBN), Interconnected Lives aimed to improve local educational networks in two disctricts of Managua in order to foster a more comprehensive educational experience in these communities. The project benefited a total of 495 individuals including children, youth, teachers and parents. It provided tutoring for children and youth, training for teachers and volunteers of the center, parents, and tutoring for students receiving scholarships.

Activities Included...

- Training on the value of reading
- Workshops with parents covering violence prevention, communication and nurturing
- Improving access to library resources
- Personal development workshops with youth.

#### **EDUCATION FOR ARTISANS**

Casa partnered with Esperanza en Acción to provide training to 139 small artisans from 10 different communities around Nicaragua. The goal of the project was to strengthen their self-sufficiency, integrate their work into the local markets, and provide them with tools to produce high quality products for export. The training included topics such as fund management and the establishment of a fair price for their goods. The workshops focused on the needs previously identified by each artisan group, which will encourage stronger decisionmaking skills for their businesses.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS: Casa supports local community development across Nicaragua. Here are our partners and projects for 2014.



**COMMUNITY PRESCHOOL CONSTRUCTION IN LAS CRUES** 

Casa, partnered with Indigenous People of Mozonte (PIM) constructed a community preschool in 2014 will provides childcare for PIM and the districts of Salamanca, San Pablo, San Pedro, and Las Cruces. Casa Canadiense first supported PIM in 2006, when it funded the renovation of their main office. This project directly benefits 35 families and their children. Prior to the construction of the preschool, the children in the community were receiving classes in the private house of a community member, where there was only space for two age groups. As a result, those in other age groups had to travel to another village to receive schooling. The new preschool provides a learning environment for all age groups.




